One Girl's Story of Love

During the baking hot months of the summer holidays my mother and I used to escape to one of the scattered lakes north of Prince Albert. In its magic surroundings we used to spend the long summer days in the open air, swimming and canoeing or just lying dreaming in the sun. In the evening the lake was always bright, luminous grey after the unbelievable sunset colors had faded.

I tried not to expect Don that night hoping he would have enough sense to wait until the storm ended. Yet in my frightened thoughts I couldn't help imagining Don fighting the storm. His motorbike, which had always looked to me so heavy and solid, seemed in my thoughts frail enough to be blown onto its side by the first gust that struck it. I thought of Don pinned under it, his face pressed into the mud.

I crawled back into bed, trying to close my throat against the tears. But when my mother, prompted by the deep sympathy and understanding between us, came in to me, she kissed my cheek and found it wet.

"Don't get upset, Jane," she said softly. "He may still come."

When she had tucked me in and gone, I lay thinking about Don, about the danger of the roads. You couldn't ride or walk along them safely after heavy rain; your feet would slip from under you. Our centres offer first-class accommodation, food and facilities - and the staffs are first-class too. Qualified teachers or professionals receive training from us, and many work with us year after year. We always employ qualified staff for activities such as swimming, tramlining and gymnastics, but some of the assistants organizing the children's games are students, many of whom came to the camp themselves when they were younger.

At most of our centres, accommodation is in a hostel or tents. It is not possible for us to arrange other accommodation, but we can send you a list of what is available in the area. To book a place at a sports camp, complete the form and send it with a cheque for the deposit to the address below. The rest of the fee can be paid at any time, but we must receive it at least one month before your camp. Please note, to keep costs down, you are charged 2.5% extra by us if you pay with your credit card. You will receive a letter of confirmation within ten days of sending your form. Cancellations made up to a month before the camp are refunded in full apart from a 5% administration fee. Fifty per cent of the fee is refunded if a cancellation

is made up to two weeks before the date of the camp. After that, no refunds can be given.

Rowing

Rowing has a long history in England. Rowing a boat with eight oars (or with four oars) was first started in England in the 18th century. At that time the boat took part in fetes and procession on the River Thames.

In the 19th century people started to use boats for racing not only in London on the Thames, but also in the universities of Oxford and Cambridge. The first boat race between Oxford and Cambridge was held in 1829.

Nearly every year since then there has been a best race between these two universities. It is held in London on the Thames, during the Easter vacation, at the end of March or at the beginning of April.

The crews of the boats chosen from the members of the college Boat Clubs train together for twelve weeks before the race, first in Oxford or Cambridge and

finally in London. In each boat there are eight oarsmen and coxswain (usually called a "cox"). The cox who is much lighter than the others sets the speed and the rhythm and street.

The course from Purney to Mortlake is 4 ½ miles long. It has many curves and there can be a lot of wind at this time of the year. The crew usually rows the 4 ½ miles in well under 20 minutes.
